These graceful, probing personal essays by award-winning fiction writer Dora Dueck engage with a diverse range of ideas (becoming a writer, motherhood, mortality, the ethics of biography, a child's coming-out) because in non-fiction, she writes, "the quest for meaning bows to the experience as it was." The topic of memory, in all its malleability, impermanence, and surprising power, is central, especially in the concluding piece, an absorbing memoir of the author's 1980s life in the Paraguayan Chaco.

Dora Dueck is the author of four books of fiction, *All That Belongs* (2019), *What You Get at Home* (2013), *This Hidden Thing* (2010), and *Under the Still Standing Sun* (1989). She grew up in Alberta, resided later in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Paraguay, and has retired to British Columbia.



A family chronicle set during the tumultuous first decades of the 20th century in what is now Ukraine. Longing for children, a young couple adopts a Russian baby; over the next years their family twists, alters, and faces very unexpected challenges. In plain, direct language, Sarah Klassen offers a story of hardship, uncertain loyalty, and strange moments of gratitude.

Manitoba author Sarah Klassen has published three previous books of fiction, including *A Feast of Longing* (2007). She is best-known as a poet, having published eight books of poetry. Her first book, in 1988, *Journey to Yalta*, won the Gerald Lampert Memorial Award (best first poetry book in Canada). Other awards include the Canadian Authors Association Poetry Award for *A Curious Beatitude* (2006).

Sarah Klassen was born in Manitoba in 1932. A Winnipeg English teacher for many years, she also taught in Lithuania and Ukraine. Her poetry has received two National Magazine Poetry Awards, one silver, one gold. In Manitoba she has been nominated for the Book of the Year Award, the Margaret Laurence Award for Fiction, and the Lansdowne Award for Poetry, often multiple times. In 2017 Sarah Klassen was shortlisted for the Mitchell Prize for Faith and Poetry, while *The Tree of Life* (2020) was shortlisted for a 2021 Word Guild Award for Christian writers. Her published work includes eight poetry collections and three books of fiction.

John Weier's poetry books include *The Violinmaker's Lament* (2002), *Stand the Sacred Tree* (2004), and *Where Calling Birds Gather* (2013). Born in Winnipeg in 1949, he currently works as a counselor and mindfulness teacher. He is a serious bird enthusiast, and recently retired from his work as a luthier. He has served as the president of the League of Canadian Poets.

David Waltner-Toews, born in 1948, has been publishing poetry, fiction, humour, mysteries, and non-fiction for nearly 50 years. His beloved poetic creation Tante Tina was celebrated with her own collection *The Complete Tante Tina: Mennonite Blues with Recipes* in 2004. He is an epidemiologist and veterinarian, with science titles such as *The Origin of Feces* (2013), *Eat the Beetles!* (2017), and *On Pandemics* (2020). Originally from Manitoba, Dr. Waltner-Toews now lives in Kitchener. Named to the Order of Canada in 2022, this year he will also release a memoir, *A Conspiracy of Chickens*.

Series editor Nathan Dueck is the author of three collections of poetry, *king's(mère)* (2003), *he'll* (2014), and *A Very Special Episode* (2019). Raised in Manitoba, he did his BA and MA in English at the University of Manitoba, and in 2009 received his doctorate from the University of Calgary. He now teaches English and Creative Writing at College of the Rockies in British Columbia.




In Search of a Mennonite Imagination Key Texts in Mennonite Literary Criticism




West of Eden Essays on Canadian Prairie Literature Sue Sorensen, editor
