Why begin your Studies at CMU?

Are you interested in university but unsure of what you want to study? Are you curious about different programs and subjects? You don't need to know what you want to study or pursue as a career before you start university!

Your first year of university is an opportunity to explore courses in different fields of study, which will help you discover what you want to pursue, while gaining skills for ongoing success in university programs. The courses that you take in your first year will contribute to fulfilling degree requirements for a variety of programs.

Program Strengths

Skill-Building: CMU's first year courses have a strong emphasis on developing strong writing and critical thinking, where students will develop the skills necessary for ongoing success in their university studies.

Mentorship: Professors work closely with students – through conversation and support outside of the classroom – to help them discern their unique interests and skills. This mentorship helps students to determine what further studies could look like.

Exploration: Taking courses in a range of subject areas provides space to explore new ideas, and to discover what you're interested in studying, while taking classes which will contribute to completing a degree.

Paths after First Year

- After exploring different courses, often students choose to major in an area where they have enjoyed the classes, and want to explore more deeply
- Some students will complete a pre-professional degree or track at CMU for further study at other universities in specializations that CMU is not currently offering, such as education, law, medicine, and more (see a full list of CMU's pre-Professional Studies Tracks here). CMU provides strong academic preparation for success in programs at other universities
- In conversation with academic advisors, students do not have to declare their program, but can continue to explore the
 different courses CMU offers
