Adjudicator Biographies

DAVID KLASSEN

David Klassen holds a Bachelor of Music in vocal performance from the University of Manitoba and a Master of Music from the University of Minnesota. With nearly two decades of experience as a university educator and professional musician, he has taught at several institutions, including Canadian Mennonite University and the University of Manitoba's Desautels Faculty of Music. His students have been accepted into music programs across Canada and the U.S., including the University of Toronto, the University of Ottawa, McGill, Boston Conservatory, and the New York Film Institute.

Praised as "charismatic and enthralling" (Opera Canada) and a "vocal powerhouse" (CBC), David has performed with companies including the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, Saskatoon Opera, and the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, singing Rossini's Largo al Factotum for a Canada Day audience of 30,000.

His connection to the Steinbach Arts Council (SAC) spans program development, concert direction, and board service. He credits SAC for shaping his career and inspiring his dedication to arts education. Recognized as a "visionary" in the Southeast, he has been acknowledged numerous times as one of the region's greatest contributors to the arts, including recent recognition by the City of Steinbach for his work.

Currently the Executive Director of SAC, David also serves on the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals Board while continuing to direct, teach, and adjudicate whenever time allows.

KELLY ROBINSON

Kelly Robinson is a singer, actor, voice teacher and vocal coach, pianist, composer, and adjudicator. Trained at the University of Manitoba Faculty of Music (voice performance/composition) with further studies through Berklee College of Music (contemporary and pop/rock vocal styles), she is the recipient of the Speake Travel and Study Scholarship for excellence in voice teaching.

Ms. Robinson has performed in Opera, Musical Theatre and Operetta, in film, television and radio. Kelly was praised by Opera Canada for her compassion and empathy onstage, most recently singing the role of Mother in Hansel and Gretel with "deep humanity". Her voice students have gone on to professional successes, performing locally at Rainbow Stage, MTC, MTYP as well as across North America and overseas.

This season, Kelly was Music Director for A Year With Frog and Toad (MTYP) and Assistant Music Director for Waitress (RMTC). In spring, she looks forward to working as Music Director for Pasek & Paul's Dogfight with Dry Cold Productions.
